well), snow removal, sanding, signs, lines, and road side abatement; just to name a few. Each one of these expenses keep our Audubon Hills home values high, maintain the desirable attributes that make Audubon Hills unique, and last but certainly not least, they keep us safe.

Talk with your neighbors. Check up on us! We assure you, nobody will have access to these addresses, except the president, vice president, & sec/tres. Never will we share, sell, or abuse your trust.

Audubon Thefts: An Update

The holidays brought many neighbors more than good cheer this last year, instead many got an infringement of their personal space. We had cases of mailbox break-ins, property theft, and identity theft in November, December, January, and February. If you don't think it could happen to you, think again. That's the first thing everyone said that had been affected.

Those of us utilizing the group mailboxes, had quickly became fed up with them getting broken into. Later we realized that these group mailboxes were not the only victims. Other neighbors, with singular mailboxes, also got bills, credit cards, checks, and packages stolen. In January, we sent out valuable links to help us all protect our identities and credit. If you didn't receive these links, this means we don't have your e-mail, please e-mail your e-mail to us today at ahpoa@techrace.com. We'll protect and preserve your e-mail trust, plus give you instant and quick alerts.

Here are some highlights from that e-mail. 1. If you feel your credit has been used by someone other than yourself, you MUST contact Ed, the postmaster at the Camino Post-office. He will direct you to the postal inspectors that are currently building a case against the culprits that invaded our privacy. 2. Be sure to bok onto your credit card bills, even the ones from the beginning of the year. Look for "test charges", they are typically in the range of a \$1 charge onto your card, to see if the card works. If it does, then they go whole hog, when you least expect it. 3. Check you credit report, this is VERY important. Without your knowledge they may have opened credit under your name. 4. Lastly, call your credit companies today, and request that they not send you "courtesy checks" any longer. They are only a courtesy to the thieves, that's why they break into the mailboxes during the holidays. Banks send these out, without our knowledge, to encourage us to charge on their card. Thieves have complete access to our credit, with these little checks. There are a few cases of these exact types of charges in Audubon Hills.

Jim and Kim had become quite frustrated with all the mailbox break-ins. It was inconceivable that nobody could have heard anything. Prying a huge metal box isn't exactly a quiet task. Later, many people stated they heard something, but didn't call the police because they didn't know what the sound was. As the saying goes, "looking back I've got 20/20", who would have known? It's been so quiet in here, we wouldn't have thought somebody was doing something so nasty.

Well, in December, someone stole our sons go-cart. Then in January, someone came to steal our trailer. Both, by the way, parked way up our driveway and previously next to each other. Because of the mailbox and go-cart thefts, we were on guard (and fed up) when we heard the creep stealing the trailer at 2am. "Night-Rider"/"Dirty Harry" or "TJ Hooker" aka:Jim McCarthy, decided to chase down the guy to get a license and slow him down. Kim was on the phone with 911. Imagine Kim's surprise when she gets a call back from 911, at 2:30am saying she needs to pick up the trailer, it was dumped on Larsen, and then pick Jim up on Smith Flat Road, because the car has been totaled. Wa Wa What?

Needless to say, Kim was relieved to find Jim 100% physically fit, but shaken. The car...well, it wasn't totaled, but it did require \$6000 worth of work. The guy didn't like Jim chasing him, and slammed into every side of the car but the back. Jim stuck with him, because the thief started throwing mail out his window, Jim realized this was "the guy" doing the mail too. The guy got away, but Jim got the license plate number. Our relentless El Dorado County detectives had to track a lot of previous owners down (it had been sold 4 times since it was last registered), but they did find the bad guy and when he was arrested he had a large number of stolen items in his garage, check making material, and stolen mail.

He ended up getting 4 years in State Prison for the trailer theft, assault with a deadly weapon, and various other thefts. Next, he'll have to go to court in Placer County for the other stolen items. Then he'll have to deal with the big boys, the Postal Inspectors. These guys plan to make an example out of him. After his state prison term, he'll have to, in Federal prison, serve for every count of mail theft he's done. That's about 30 counts of mail theft for each time he broke into a group box, times 8 boxes in Camino, times at least 4 separate break-ins, that's a lot of time. Will he do it again? Who knows, but he's gone for awhile now and hopefully all his little friends will know now that we don't want them up here anymore.
