Fire Danger! The Risks of Weed and Brush Removal

This is a simple fact...metal sparks can cause fires. This means that if you are going to help yourself, your neighborhood, and your local firefighters, by removing fire danger...BE SMART!! Any type of brush removal during the summer can be dangerous, especially when using those yard tools that have metal blades or gas motors. Many fires in the area have started from well intended people making, what later seem like, obvious mistakes. Please, if you're clearing your property, take the following steps. They will help you help yourself and your neighbors.

1. Metal blades striking

rocks can create sparks and start fires; use caution and don't run blades over rocky areas.



- Instead of using a metal blade, use a weed eater with the plastic string that whips around and cuts the weeds.
- Make sure all internal combustion engines are tuned up and equipped

with an operable spark arrester.

- 4. Always clear in the morning when the fire danger is lower.
- Have a hose or fire extinguisher with you when clearing, so spot fires can be put out quickly.
- Take a phone with you, to immediately call 911 if there is a problem.
- Don't let overheated machinery 'cool down' on dry grasses.

These simple steps will help all of us keep safe in this unusually dry summer.

Disaster specialists say "The more self reliant and independent you are, the greater your chances of survival will be. The greatest problem people have is apathy." In most cases, it's not a lack of concern; it's more of denial. Most people

have a false sense of security; they think it won't happen to them. Well...that's what every person says that loses everything in a fire. "I didn't think it would happen to me."

So here's our challenge to you: Assume that it <u>can</u> happen to you, and hope that it won't. Kim McCarthy took a lot of

AHCSD-Your Road Committee Update

In June our AHCSD chairman, Mike Fennessy, lost his battle with cancer. His dedication and planning for our roads will be appreciated for many years to come. Our thoughts are with is family.

Currently AHCSD is focusing on paving the side roads. The number of residents served on each road, will determine the paving order. Waxwing will be the first side road to be paved, and Veerkamp was awarded the bid. Paving will start this summer, and residents will be notified of the dates, as soon as we know.

All side roads within Audubon Hills will be widened, within their easements, to 14'; and cul-de-sacs will be graded and paved at the end of each road. The widening will allow for emergency personal to have room to pass each other, and the culde-sacs will give them room to turn around.

Please take note of the

AHCSD easements, represented by dashed lines, on your property plot map. If you currently have planted or built items within the easement, they may need to be moved. Help AHCSD help make your neighborhood safer; be prepared that you may need to move these items before paving.

This planned improvement will increase safety and insure that our homes can be accessed in the event of a emergency.

<u>Water Wise-Did you know?</u>

You can save up to 8 gallons of water if you turn off the tap while brushing your teeth in the morning and at bedtime. That adds up to a savings of more than 100 gallons of water per person each month.



A leaky toilet can waste about 200 gallons of water every day! To determine if your toilet is leaking, place a drop of food coloring in the tank. If the color shows in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak.

<u>Recycle</u>

Did you know that you can request additional yard waste recycle bins for free or a reasonable fee? Just think how quickly you could get rid of that fire danger on your property, and the time you'll save not having to do *another* burn pile. Simply call Waste Connections at (530) 626-4141 to order yours. They deliver them on Tuesdays.

Acceptable Items to place in, or next to, your recycle cart:

- All California redemption value drink containers
- Clean paper and mail
- Corrugated cardboard
- Cereal boxes (without the liner) / Shoe boxes
- Brown paper bags
- Newspaper and magazines
- Shredded paper in tied clear plastic bags
- Paperback books
- Catalogs, phone books
- Milk cartons
- Juice boxes
- Soy milk cartons
- Frozen food boxes
- Plastic bottles, jars and jugs No caps
- Plastic dairy tubs (yogurt, margarine) No lids
- All colors of glass jars, bottles and jugs No lids
- Aluminum foil or foil baking pans
- Aluminum cans
- Steel or tin cans

- All colors of glass jars, bottles and jugs, with lids and caps removed.
- Scrap metal (limit 2 ft. x 2 ft., 35 pounds; without wood, plastic, or rubber attachments)
- Motor Oil Recycle

Acceptable Items to place in your Yard Waste Cart: Plant material

- Grass
- Leaves

- Branches and twigs (<4" in diameter and <4 ' long)
- Small trees; sections <4' long; base <4" diameter.
