Winter is Coming ... Are you Ready?

Our neighbor & AHA Board President, Larry Linville, submitted this detailed "to do list" for winter preparations.

- ◇ Weather strip leaky doors & windows
- ◇ Get chimneys cleaned
- ◇ Clean leaves & other debris from roofs & rain gutters
- ◇ Know the location of your main water turnoff valve should you have a water pipe burst from freezing.

"In 37 years here, I have experienced a wide variety of local winters - some mild, some moderate, and some down right nasty. These are the preparations that I recommend, based on 'real world' experience. Been there - done that!"

- ◇ Insulate exterior pipes
- ◇ Disconnect hoses from exterior faucets
- ◇ Protect or bring in plants that can be damaged from frost/freezing
- ◇ Store away outside items prone to weather damage
- ◇ Inspect/repair outdoor shelters for pets
- ◇ Restock first aid kit
- ◇ Get acquainted with your neighbors that could lend

- a hand in an emergency
- ◇ Identify neighbors that may need your assistance (elderly, frail, medical issues, live alone)
- ◇ Have PG&E's phone number handy (1-800-743-5000) to report & remove downed trees from power lines. They are trained & equipped to handle it safely. Do not attempt doing it yourself - high voltage kills!
- ◇ Have PG&E's phone number handy to report or get info on power outages. Don't assume someone else has called. The sooner they know of the outage, the sooner they can fix it.

It's Time to Check Your Winter Supplies

And here's a checklist to use for your "Winter Supply" Inventory:

- ◇ Flashlights & other emergency lighting
- ◇ Extra batteries & lantern fuels
- ◇ Extra matches & candles
- ◇ Working fire extinguisher
- ◇ Adequate wood & propane
- ◇ Backup water & food supplies (cash registers fail with no electricity & roads may be impassable)
- ◇ Manual can opener if electricity fails
- ◇ Backup cooking method (if electricity fails).
- ◇ Snow & ice removal tools
- ◇ Cat litter or rock salt for icy sidewalks/driveways
- ◇ Tarps in case of roof leaks
- ◇ A chain saw, with properly stored gas, bar oil and spare sharp chains (to cut up trees blocking your driveway - downed during heavy snowstorms & high wind events).
- ◇ Battery or solar powered radio for emergency information (assume no TV or internet without electricity)
- ◇ Non-electric heat source for gently thawing frozen pipes
- ◇ Adequate blankets & winter clothing (rain gear, hats, scarves, gloves, coats, heavy socks, waterproof boots, etc.)
- ◇ Emergency cash (ATMs fail with no electricity)
- ◇ Alternate method for charging cell phones (spare batteries, solar charger, 12 volt adapter for vehicle plug in)
- ◇ Inspect/replace vehicle windshield wipers, battery, snow tires, and chains
- ◇ Keep vehicle fuel tanks at least 1/2 full
- ◇ Emergency gasoline/diesel in approved storage container (gas pumps fail with no electricity)
- ◇ Similar emergency items for vehicles should you become stranded

Water Wise & Drought Resistant

Did you know?

- ◇ You can save up to 8 gallons of water if you turn off the tap while brushing your teeth. That adds up to a savings of more than 100 gallons of water per person each month!
- ◇ Turning off the water while washing your hair can save up to 150 gallons a month!
- ◇ A leaky toilet can waste about 200 gallons of water every day! To determine if your toilet is leaking, place a drop of food coloring in the tank. If the color shows in the bowl without flushing,

you have a leak.

- ◇ Insulating your water pipes with pre-slit foam pipe insulation will get the hot water to you faster and avoid wasting water while it heats up. But while you're waiting...collect the water & use it on plants.
- ◇ You don't need to rinse your dishes - that's what the dishwasher is for! To save water, scrape off the food instead of rinsing.
- ◇ If your lawn springs back up when you step on it, it doesn't need water. If it stays flat, it's ready for wa-

tering. Most lawns only need about 1" of water each week.

- ◇ Mulch will slow evaporation of moisture while discouraging weed growth. Adding 2-4 inches of organic material such as compost or bark mulch will increase the ability of the soil to retain water. Press the mulch down around the drip line of each plant to form a slight depression which will prevent or minimize water runoff.
- ◇ Use sprinklers that deliver large drops close to the ground. Small drops and mist often evaporate.

Is Your Home Fire Safe?

These simple steps from the CDF can dramatically increase the chance of your home surviving a wildfire!

- ◇ Create a **DEFENSIBLE SPACE** of 100' around your home. The area closest to your home is the most important.
- ◇ Try to get 10 to 15 feet of spacing, both vertically & horizontally between shrubs, large plants, & trees. If you have 4 foot high brush underneath larger trees with limbs, limb up the tree at least 14 feet. Breaks like this in the vegetation help to slow down an advancing fire and gives firefighters a fighting chance.

- ◇ Plan your landscape to eliminate a continuous path of vegetation. Do not have any combustible fuel within three feet of your home.
- ◇ For landscaping purposes, use of irrigated fire resistant plants is encouraged. Green lawn, rock, stone, and other materials can be used to create an attractive and fire safe landscape.
- ◇ Clear all vegetation and other flammable materials from beneath your deck.
- ◇ Enclose undersides of elevated decks with fire resistant building materials, or with screen mesh with openings no greater than 1/4 inch.

- ◇ Keep trees trimmed at least 10' from your chimney and trim all dead limbs hanging over your house or garage.
- ◇ Clean all needles & leaves from the roof, eaves, and rain gutters.
- ◇ Maintain your landscaping with regular weeding to keep it fire safe.

More than 1,700 structures are destroyed by wildfire each year just within CDF's jurisdiction. **Don't become a statistic ... be Fire Safe!**

Register With The Emergency Alert Notification System

A big "Thank You!" to our neighbor, Inge Clarke, for sending us an article she saw in the EDC Area Agency on Aging's July, 2014 "Senior Times". Due to copyright, here are the main points:

You can register for emergency notifications through the El Dorado County Sheriff's Office (EDSO), Office of Emergency Services (OES), or Emergency Notification System

The system sends out individual alerts about public health & public safety emergencies that would affect your area, including, but not limited to:

- ◇ evacuations,
- ◇ threatening floods or fires,

- ◇ hazardous material spills,
- ◇ terrorist threats & other urgent law enforcement operations.
- ◇ Public health and safety related messages during or after an emergency event.

The Alert Notification System uses the 9-1-1 database to call and deliver a recorded message only to landline phone numbers in the area affected by the emergency event. However, if you are not at home, you will not receive the notification and may not be aware of the emergency.

Fortunately, the El Dorado County Alert Notification System has a solution: You can also register your chosen con-

tact information through the systems Self Registration Portal and you will also be notified on your cell phone via call or text, a Voice over IP (VoIP) phone, or at your email address.

It is important not to rely on any one method of staying informed and receiving emergency information. In any emergency situation, reacting quickly and calmly is of the utmost importance.

- Slower speeds prevent anxiety & road rage.

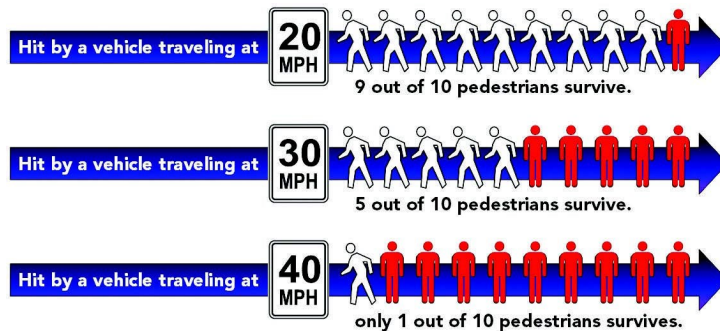

This race serves as the largest fundraiser of the year for the Camino School Parent Teacher Organization (PTO). The funds that are gathered from this event fund all of the extracurricular transportation needs for the year, including all of the school's awesome field trips.

Without this funding, our children would not enjoy those field trips. This event also fully funds their garden program. Funding also goes to sports program supplies, classroom supplies, and other spe-

They are a Camino area volunteer organization, dedicated to improving things in the general Camino area. They initiated Camino cleanup,

annual Take Back the Night, and fundraisers for Camino School and other community needs. Their website is www.caminocac.com.

Dog owners

Be aware that in El Dorado County, free roaming dogs harassing livestock may be shot by the effected property owner. Keep your dogs leashed or in enclosures.

Be courteous to your neighbors - many folks walk the streets of Audubon Hills and walk along the roadside to avoid traffic. They tend to get quite irritated when they step into your dog's droppings. If you walk your dog on the streets, please take responsibility and take along a plastic bag to clean up your dog's waste. Don't leave it for someone else to deal with.

Allowed Land usage

Audubon Hills has no CC & R s. Most property in the community is zoned R2A, residential two acre minimum, limited agriculture. Land uses are restricted by County zoning - See El Dorado County Planning and Building Departments for information.

Limited non-commercial farm animals (horses, Donkeys, Mules, Chickens, Cattle, Goats, sheep, Ducks, Rabbits, Turkeys, Dogs, Cats, etc.) are allowed as long as they do not constitute a public health hazard or community nuisance. Retail businesses with associated frequent traffic are not allowed. Yard sales and Limited sale of home grown fruits / vegetables / eggs etc. with infrequent traffic is allowed.

Non-compliance with zoning uses should be reported to the County which has the legal authority to enforce. The County relies on the residents to inform them of non-compliance issues.

Drought water conservation

El Dorado Irrigation District Board member George Osborn reminded everyone that water conservation during our drought is very important. The water we save this year, may be the water we have available to use next year, if we have another drought winter.

Fire Danger

Retired CDF Chief George Osborn was asked for his assessment of the current fire dangers. In a word, George responded - "Catastrophic". It is vitally important, that folks maintain a defensible space of 100 feet around all of their structures, cleared of all heavy brush and accumulated pine needle fuel. The 30 feet immediately around the house should be down to bare earth or lawns.

It was reported that the Camino fire station is currently unmanned due to El Dorado County Fire budget reductions. If you feel this increases your fire danger, contact Mike Hardy at 644-9630 or at www.eldroadocountyfire.com and the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors, to voice your concern.

Fire Exit

The proposed fire exit on the north-west end of Audubon Hills is currently in limbo. The owners who originally gave permission for the fire exit through their property have sold the property, and there was no written agreement for an easement for the fire exit. The new owners have been having problems with walkers and recreational vehicles cutting through their property and are reluctant to grant exit access. The Association will continue to work on securing one or more emergency fire exits.

Presentations

Members of Sierra Wildlife Rescue gave a very informative presenta-

tion on how to protect your house and how to protect your pets, and the dangers to wildlife and how we can help wildlife to survive. If you find injured wildlife, please contact them for assistance with proper care. They asked us to please confine our housecats so that the bird population is not being decimated. They warned that small dogs can be seriously injured or killed by deer. They brought along a horned owl and a screech owl and gave us extensive information about each bird.

Association Reports

Neighborhood watch

Please insure that we have your current contact information so that you can be notified of neighborhood safety issues. Keep an eye on any vacant or vacation houses to prevent burglary or vandalism. If you see suspicious vehicles, record the license number and report it to Sheriff's office and then call Kim McCarthy with the information so she can have that information and share it with the neighbors if needed.

Bench status

We have one bench ready to install.

Flower Status

No new planting due to drought conditions. Previously planted Daffodils require little care.

Community Dumpsters

Solid waste dumpsters have been donated by El Dorado Disposal at the annual spring Camino Cleanup day held at the old Sierra Pacific mill site.

In the Spring, a green waste dumpster was provided by the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council. Due to funding restrictions, the dumpster was only available for a brief time period, and due to unintended compressed legal funding timelines, we were given very short notice of the dumpster's availability. Funding for brush chipping is not available at this time.

Audubon Hills Community Service District Report

This year the CSD will be improving Mockingbird Lane, working on a cul-de-sac on Kittywake Lane and doing seal coating on Audubon Drive for crack filling. Surfacing of Waxwing Lane, Kingfisher Lane and Black Bird Lane were done in previous years. Road side clearing has been done. If you see needed road repairs or additional clearing needs, please contact the CSD. Tanager Lane will be the next road, after Mockingbird Lane, to be improved.

By-law changes

The proposed by-law changes were passed by a unanimous vote of the members present. Notification of the proposed by-law changes were sent to 111 known owner/renter e-mail addresses and 28 mailing addresses at least 21 days before the meeting, as required by the Association by-laws.

- Eliminated the unneeded terms "active" and "in good standing". If the parcel's dues were paid, they are members, active and are in good standing.
- One membership and associated voting rights and related services per parcel of land that has paid the annual dues.
- Clarified that the payment of annual dues with related voting rights and services are the responsibility of the parcel land owner, which may be delegated to renters.
- Clarified that the Directors are elected by the voting members at large.
- Clarified that the Directors themselves elect their president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer.

Open forum for discussion or new business

If you want to receive Association related business or emergency (like local forest fire) notifications please ensure neighborhood watch has your current contact information.

Darrin McNeice asked if a link to a community social media web-site could be added to the Audubon Hills web site. Jim McCarthy requested that Darrin e-mail him the link. Jim McCarthy has requested permission from the Audubon Hills Community Service District and Audubon Hills Association Boards of Directors to add the link to the community's official web site.

Darrin McNeice asked if there could be a hiking / biking trail around the perimeter of Audubon Hills. The Association Board of Directors will discuss the feasibility.

Jim Wells asked if an Association committee could be formed to address community repair issues within Audubon Hills. He was asked if he would chair that committee and he accepted.

The meeting was adjourned.

Quarterly Board Meeting Minutes for 08/14/14

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 am. Board Members present: Larry Linville, Sue Collier, Larry Wilson, Russell Anders, Nancy Hegarty.

Association Officers discussion:

Discussed Secretary-Treasurer's duties

Discussed Association Officer's responsibilities and ethics

Discussed and voted to hold routine Association Board meeting quarterly (within 1st two weeks of February, May, August, and November). Any "emergency" issues can be handled by telephone or e-mail. The decision was unanimous.

Board member Nancy Hegarty volunteered to assist with meeting minutes and newsletters.

Discussed financial tools used (Quickbooks), IRS & Franchise Tax Board requirements, banking requirements & PayPal arrangements.

Discussed and voted to allow all Association Board members to sign checks. Further action will be tabled until a change can be made to the Association by-law, which will require a ratification vote by Association members. The decision was unanimous.

Secretary-Treasurer to update bank checkbook signature authority with new Association Officers by taking Board Meeting Minutes and By-Laws to bank.

Election of Officers:

The Directors elected their own Officers, as per the Association by-laws:

General Discussion of Association Responsibilities:

Discussed and voted to have the Spring dumpster provided by the annual Camino Clean-Up Day, and the Association to provide the Fall garbage dumpster in late October. Association will at-

tempt to get Fall “green waste” dumpsters provided by the El Dorado Fire Safe Council if funding is available. Otherwise Association will attempt to provide funding if economically feasible. The decision was unanimous.

New Business:

- Discussed fire exits. Consensus is to continue pursuing.
- Discussed new community repair committee chaired by Jim Wells. Bench being installed at corner of Audubon Drive and Kingfisher Lane.
- Discussed feasibility of AHA “notifications & meeting minutes” board alongside or under CSD Boards. It was decided that it was not needed.
- Discussed and voted on a request to consider a biking/walking trail around the perimeter of Audubon Hills. It was decided that this trail is not feasible due to owner’s and resident’s security concerns, potential costs of construction and ongoing maintenance, potential injury liability, and the unlikelihood of getting permission from all 39 community perimeter parcel owners for right-of-way access. The Board determined that the existing non-exclusive right-of-way of the community’s roads provides ample opportunity for walking and biking without additional costs or concerns. The decision was unanimous.
- Discussed and voted on a request for Association Board permission to add a link to nextdoor.com on the Audubon Hills website. It was decided to not grant permission. The decision was unanimous.

The meeting was adjourned.
